MINUTES OF BOARD MEETING MARCH 4, 2021

Upon duly given notice, the monthly Board Meeting of the Central Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (CPTA) Board of Directors was held by Zoom on March 4, 2021, at 415 Zarfoss Drive, York, PA 17404.

Members Present: Raymond Rosen, Darlene Brown, Thomas Wilson, Carrie Gray, Kirk Stoner, Annie Strite, Philip Robbins, Richard Carson and Keith Martin.

Others Attending: Richard Farr, Executive Director; Bonnie Stine, Controller; Michael Bernhardt, Director of Mobility Services; Jenna Reedy, Chief of Staff; Jamie Leonard, Director of Human Resources; Dwight Huntington, Planning and Procurement Manager; Tony Mundy, Maintenance Superintendent; Trevor Manahan, Chief Operating Officer; Stephen Baldwin, Chief Financial Officer; Monica Young, Management Communications Specialist; Christopher Zdanis, CAT Chief Operating Officer, Angela Bednar, CAT Executive Assistant.

Raymond Rosen called the meeting to order at 7:04PM.

Public Attendees: Mike Pritchard, Tom Austin

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Mike Pritchard and Tom Austin presented on the Transfer Center Renovation/King Street Bike Lane Partnership Project. The goal for the project is to improve multi-modal access and safety to the Transfer Center. It will provide driveway traffic signal control and bus preemption timings on W. King Street. Flashing signals will be installed for pedestrians on S. Pershing/Mason Avenue for the bus vehicles exit safety. It will improve bicycle access to the Transfer Center and Rail Trail. This project will complete a portion of the King St. Bike Lane Enhancement Project. Project cost is \$430,000.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

A motion to approve the minutes from the regular CPTA Board of Directors meeting on February 4, 2021, was moved by Richard Carson, seconded by Thomas Wilson and passed unanimously.



YAMPO TRANSIT COMMITTEE:

No business.

COMMUNICATIONS:

Annie Strite's reappointment letter was presented to the board.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Steve Baldwin reviewed the financial statements for the period ending January 31, 2021. Covid continues to suppress ridership. There is no indication yet of ridership recovery. We have begun to use a subcontractor, MTS, who was used prior to COVID for 3% of the trips. PennDOT is discussing the possibility of up to a 3% reduction in our State funding in FY 2023 as they are anticipating a reduction in the Turnpike fares that they collect and use to finance public transit. They specifically wanted to know what such a reduction would mean for us. After the free trips for vaccinations, all CARES Act funds will be committed. As noted on the dashboard, February was the first month for the Gettysburg-Hanover Connector with 118 riders.

STAFF REPORTS:

Michael Bernhardt provided an update on the free vaccine transportation. In the last three weeks there were 109 round trips. Of the 109 trips, 26 riders were lapsed or new riders. There will be an article in the Wall Street Journal Monday morning in regard to this topic. A Wall Street reporter rode with a client from Port Trevorton to Evangelical Hospital to receive the vaccine.

Richard Farr gave an update on the Act 44 Performance Review. A draft was received and rabbittransit was able to comment. One of their goals for rabbittransit was to increase ridership by half a percent. We believe this goal to be unachievable given the effect of the pandemic on ridership and would instead focus on a goal to return to baseline ridership numbers pre-COVID.

Richard Farr discussed the Transit Service Concept Proposal for the northern counties. Designated Stop Service utilizes shared ride routes to offer low-cost trips to designated places. Possible designated stops were reviewed. The next phase would be to introduce Stop Hopper. Three proposed areas for Stop Hopper were Danville to Bloomsburg, Lewisburg to Milton and Selinsgrove to Northumberland. Stop Hopper in the northern counties would operate Monday through Friday, 6am to 6pm with one vehicle per zone.

Keith Martin asked what was in the future for microtransit in Franklin County. Carrie Gray also mentioned the critical need for this service in this area. A motion was made by the board for the Executive Director to approach PennDOT with a recommendation to advance microtransit in Franklin County.

Richard Farr discussed the possibility of a \$15 hourly wage and the financial effect that it will have on transportation providers across the state.

Jamie Leonard provided an EEO update. The statistics from 2020 were presented and included in the board packet. rabbittransit continually strives to focus on the recruitment of females and minorities in accordance with our EEO plan. The board observed that overall, our numbers reflect the diversity of the community we represent as identified by the detailed census data used for analysis.



Trevor Manahan informed the board of the Transfer Center renovations that will begin on March 15. Ticket sales will no longer be sold at the Transfer Center as of 12pm on March 10. Ticket sales will be available at the Center of Independent Living. On March 11, passengers will begin boarding on the King Street Bridge. The completion date is slated for late fall.

Angela Bednar was introduced as the Executive Assistant from CAT. She will coordinate CPTA board activities in the future.

No executive session.

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

Covid-19 Vaccine Access: How Rural Transit Agencies Are Helping Get the Shots in Arms

A local transportation service in central Pennsylvania offers free rides to people who can't otherwise get to vaccination sites

PORT TREVORTON, Pa.—On a recent overcast morning, Lou Ann Share waited for the bus in the kitchen of her family's yellow-sided house as her daughter made waffles for her 8-year-old twins.

Ms. Share, a 66-year-old retired florist, had secured a Covid-19 vaccination appointment at a hospital 30 minutes from her home in this rural community in central Pennsylvania. But she couldn't drive herself because of chronic pain from an accident 25 years ago, and nobody else in the family could take her.

"If it wasn't for Rabbit, I wouldn't be able to do this," she said, referring to Rabbittransit, a local transportation agency that is giving free rides to vaccination sites across 11 counties.

For Ms. Share and others like her, rural transit agencies are providing more than rides. They are the crucial link to long-awaited protection from the deadly coronavirus. Across the U.S., the agencies have been adapting since the start of the pandemic a year ago. When ridership fell sharply, some of the services pivoted to delivering groceries and prescription drugs. Since the vaccine rollout began, a growing number have started

offering free rides, changing bus routes, hosting vaccination sites or organizing clinics on wheels to take vaccines to people.

In West Texas, more than 700 people have been vaccinated at a clinic inside Spartan Rural Public Transit's new facility in the city of Levelland. In Washington state, Twin Transit teamed up with Lewis County, the United Way and Bird's Eye Medical to run mobile clinics at fairgrounds, schools, fire stations and senior centers that have led to more than 2,400 vaccinations. Twin Transit ferries medical staff and equipment to clinics when needed and takes vaccine recipients to the sites in vans.







Ms. Share, 66, greeted the driver for Rabbittransit, a transportation service that takes people to get a Covid-19 vaccine, on March 4 at her Port Trevorton home. Ms. Share registered at Evangelical Community Hospital in Lewisburg. A nurse, Jackie Mast, administered the vaccine.

An infusion of federal aid is helping agencies cope with the pandemic's various impacts. Congress approved \$2.7 billion for rural transit in two prior Covid relief bills and added \$317 million in the recent \$1.9 trillion stimulus package.

Since launching its free vaccination ride program in mid-February, Rabbit has taken more than 230 people to vaccination appointments, Executive Director Richard Farr said. Some don't have a car, or can't drive because of age or disability; others can't turn to family

because of job schedules, he said. The agency is using federal Cares Act funds along with existing state subsidies to cover the cost.

"We have to reach herd immunity, and the only way is if everybody has an opportunity to get the vaccine," Mr. Farr said.

Just over 19% of Pennsylvania residents have received at least one dose of coronavirus vaccine, slightly above the nationwide figure, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. In largely rural Snyder County, where Ms. Share lives, that figure is 15.3%, state data show.

Mobility is a perpetual challenge in the region, said Kendra Aucker, president and chief executive of 132-bed Evangelical Community Hospital in Lewisburg, where Ms. Share booked her vaccination slot. Nearly a quarter of residents in Snyder County struggle with transportation, a 2017 Greater Susquehanna Valley United Way report found.

Many people are carpooling to hospitals for their shots, Ms. Aucker said; others rely on Rabbit. "If you don't have anybody to help you, it's the only way to get a vaccine," she said.

Transit agencies in some parts of the U.S. are waiting for vaccine supplies to increase before stepping up efforts to get people to sites, said Scott Bogren, executive director of the nonprofit Community Transportation Association of America.

Ms. Share is a Rabbit regular, paying reduced fares for trips to pain-management appointments. She was seriously hurt in a car crash in 1995, after being rear-ended while driving home from her job as a floral designer. She injured an eye and needed plates, screws and rods in her neck. She said she is often in pain and doesn't trust herself to drive farther than nearby Hilsher's General Store.


"I used to be this independent person. Raised kids on my own, worked two jobs. Then one car accident takes it all away," she said. "Without Rabbit I would be really stuck."

On the morning of her appointment, Ms. Share bantered with her daughter, Lindsey Corbin, as the 8-year-olds began their virtual school day and the family's two burly dogs, Max and Fizey, lumbered around the kitchen.

"You're excited, right?" Ms. Corbin said.

"Yes, I am," Ms. Share said. "So I can start being safe."

Ms. Share said at first she wasn't sure she wanted a shot given the vaccines' rapid development. "But I stuck with the science and Dr. Fauci," she said, referring to Dr. Anthony Fauci, the government's <u>top infectious-diseases expert</u>. Her 86-year-old mother, Betty Ann Hackett, has had both doses, and Ms. Corbin, whose immune system was ravaged by cancer treatment and who seldom drives because of a seizure disorder, received her first.







Ms. Share's daughter, 43-year-old Lindsey Corbin, fed the farm animals with her daughter, 8-year-old Kassidy Keefer. Ms. Share looked over her grandchild Emma's school work. Ms. Share's mother, 86-year-old Betty Ann Hackett, with Fizey at home in in Port Trevorton.

Now it was Ms. Share's turn. When the door to the empty minibus opened, she greeted driver John Bolig and settled into a seat by the door for the drive north to Lewisburg.

"Away we go," Mr. Bolig said, heading down Silver Creek Road to the four-lane highway that runs along the broad Susquehanna River. He and Ms. Share chatted about a local university and news that Hobby Lobby plans to open a store nearby.

After her arrival at Evangelical, hospital staff members briskly guided Ms. Share through registration. Minutes later, she was rolling up the sleeve of her sweater for nurse Jackie Mast.

"That's it," Ms. Mast said after injecting <u>the vaccine developed</u> by <u>Pfizer</u> Inc. and <u>BioNTech SE</u>.

"Oh my gosh, nothing. You're wonderful," Ms. Share said with a laugh.

"It's like my two-thousandth shot," the nurse replied.

After the 15-minute observation period, Ms. Share had to linger another hour in the airy lobby before the bus pulled up to take her back home, where the family's pigs, chickens and ducks would need tending. She said she didn't mind the wait.

"I feel relieved," she said.

Financial Statement & Statistical Notes for February 2021

- The financial statements, enclosed with these notes, are as of February 28, 2021. This is the end
 of the 8th Month of fiscal year 2020/2021 and the eleventh month under the Pennsylvania
 COVID-19 Emergency Proclamation.
 - The presented financial statements have been updated for the adopted fiscal year 2021 budget.
 - The budget is entered into the statements using 1/12 of the total budget monthly.
 - The adopted budget was prepared pre-COVID-19 and does not reflect any anticipated impacts to the Authority.
 - A column has been added to the income statement with the previous fiscal year to date information. This column has been shaded in grey to identify it is for comparative purposes and not part of the normal income statement.
- This month continues to reflect the ongoing impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on our operating performance.
 - > These notes were prepared prior to the gathering of information for the dashboard. The board will be updated with the monthly dashboard & will be given a short overview at the board meeting.
 - With the final Act 44 Performance Report received from PA DOT, the performance measurement charts have been updated to reflect the new PA DOT issued targets.

- ➤ The performance measurement charts shows only a slight improvement from January for metrics involving cost. This is due to expenses normalizing and being slightly lower in February than in January. The fixed route ridership dipped again in February compared to January. This was the lowest for any month this fiscal year; but, still better than our lowest COVID month April 2020 with only 44,934 trips.
- Paratransit trips additionally dipped slightly again in February compared to January. It also was the lowest ridership month this fiscal year; but, still better than our lowest COVID month April 2020 with only 14,714 trips.
- ➤ We have continued to use a subcontractor, who was used pre-COVID, for paratransit trips in February.
 - Pre-COVID, about 7% of all paratransit trips are subcontracted; however, this month, 2.7% of the trips are being subcontracted which is slightly less than the previous number of 3%.
- Total revenue is 32% under budget.
 - Operating revenues 8% under budget for February; 3% under budget YTD
 - ➤ Grant income 50% under budget for February; 41% under budget YTD
 - Paratransit divisional losses are evaluated for subsidy at the close of the fiscal year.
 - We utilized the remaining available Federal CARES Act funding during February and also used other operating funds to cover our monthly deficit. All other operating funds are available for future use to assist with cash flows and future sustainability of the system.

- Total expenses are 25% under budget for February; 21% under budget YTD
 - ➤ The Materials and Supplies expense category is under budget by 8% for February, but remains over budget YTD by 18%.
 - This is an ongoing effect of out of the ordinary supplies needed for pandemic purposes.
 - No other major expense category exceeded the expense budget, with the exception of Passed Through Expenses.
 - This category is used for the MATP program mileage reimbursements. It is fully covered through our funding agreement with Department of Human Services.


